

Women's Refuge

Women's Refuge is New Zealand's lead agency in providing domestic violence services. It has 40 years experience in providing comprehensive services, reaching on average 25,000 women and children each year.

Every nine minutes Women's Refuge receives a crisis call and an average of 244 women and children use refuge safe houses each night across the country.

Women's Refuge consists of 43 affiliated independent refuges and the support they offer ranges from advocacy and intensive support for women and children in the community to awareness and education courses. Two-thirds of the Refuge work force is unpaid volunteers.

Since 1995, NZ Sculpture OnShore has been able to donate more than \$1.2 million to Women's Refuge to help victims in their journey to live free from domestic violence.

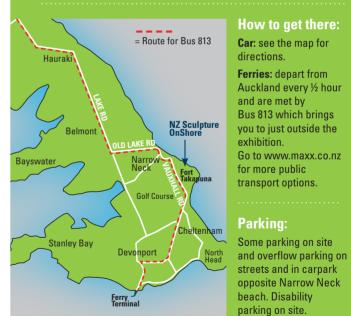
